This anthem may be sung by any two groups in a variety of voicings: women/men, two-part treble children or women, two-part men, two equal groups of mixed voices, or by intergenerational choirs.

Although Oboe is the preferred instrument, any C instrument may play the part. If played on Flute, some portions will be quite low, especially for younger players. It may be necessary to make some adjustments for the player.

Percussion may be played by choir members. Crotales are pitched bells, with a sound similar to Asian temple bells. It may be possible to borrow a set from a college or high school. Handbells or Handchimes may be substituted, although the sound of Crotales is richer and has more overtone development.

This melody is an ancient tune sung by the indigenous people of Taiwan. They lived on their island centuries before the Chinese from across the straits moved in as merchants, traders, and later, after about 1660, as rulers of the land.
